## 9:15 a.m. Enhancing Safety and Security Measures in Health Care: Strategies for Protecting Health Care Professionals

Jason Grellner, Vice President and Head of Healthcare, Evolv Technology, Waltham, Massachusetts

In recent years, there has been a notable escalation in incidents of workplace violence in U.S. health care facilities. About half the members belonging to the American College of Emergency Physicians and the Emergency Nurses Association have reported encountering some form of violence in their professional environments. This figure surges to 70% among emergency department nurses. Given these compelling statistics, it's imperative to safeguard the work environment of our health care professionals. Grellner will discuss:

- Elevating security measures and enhancing emergency response protocols.
- Evaluating the substantial impact of comprehensive safety training for the workforce.
- Harnessing the potential of artificial intelligence in preparing and responding to active threats.
- Leveraging effective situational awareness techniques.
- Safety and security best practices in health care.

#### **SPEAKERS**

Chris Blomgren retired from the volunteer fire service and public emergency management service after 30 years of public service. During Blomgren's tenure with Kahoka and Clark County fire and emergency management agencies, he created interagency training and exercise plans incorporating hundreds of participants from rural Missouri annually. Additionally, as a volunteer leader with Team Rubicon, Blomgren designed the organization's first full-scale mobilization exercise incorporating dozens of agencies and over 100 volunteers. This event set the standard for preplanned events. He consults with health care facilities about rural health care preparedness, focusing on partnerships, planning and exercises. Blomgren holds an associate degree in nursing, a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's in emergency preparedness. He has completed the Master Exercise Practitioner Program and National Emergency Management Advanced Academy and is enrolled in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Emergency Management Executive Academy.

Jason Grellner brings a wealth of experience in public safety to his role at Evolv Technology. Before joining the company, Grellner held positions with Mercy Healthcare, including executive director and director of the public safety ministry. During his tenure, he implemented innovative programs and sophisticated technological solutions to ensure the safety and security of staff and patients. With a career spanning 27 years, Grellner was a distinguished lieutenant with the Franklin County (Missouri) Sheriff's Department in various divisions, including detectives, narcotics, civil process and the courthouse.

Kristopher Mattson is the System Safety and Emergency Management director at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. Mattson oversees a team of emergency management staff and campus safety managers. He also supports the state as the coordinator for the Specialty Coordinating Hospital, which works with Georgia's five pediatric health care facilities and 13 regional health care coalitions to prepare for pediatric emergencies. Before joining Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, Mattson had over a decade of emergency management experience with a jurisdictional program in Pennsylvania, managing a regional program for an international consulting company and the preparedness program for the country's eighth-largest mass transit system. He's an adjunct professor for a higher education institution in Pennsylvania, where he delivers emergency management administration classes to undergraduate students. Mattson is certified at the federal and state levels to provide numerous Federal Emergency Management Agency training classes.

Kristine Sanger is the director of training and exercise programs at the Center for Preparedness and Emergency Response Solutions with the University of Nebraska Medical Center's College of Public Health. Sanger is primarily responsible for developing exercises and education to help Nebraska hospitals, long-term care facilities and responding agencies prepare for disasters. She has been trained in health care business continuity through DRI International and is a certified health care provider continuity professional. Sanger has 13 years of health care experience, which includes working as an infection control and patient safety specialist in small and large hospitals, an embryologist in an assisted-reproductive technology clinic and a medical technologist in a large clinical laboratory in the blood banking, chemistry and microbiology departments. She received her Bachelor of Science in medical technology from the University of South Dakota. Sanger is affiliated with the Association for Professionals in Infection Control and Prevention, Omaha Metropolitan Medical Response System, DRI International, and the American Society of Clinical Pathology.
