This session explores the key principles of influential leadership, helping attendees move from being a leader people must follow to one they want to follow. Learn how to cultivate authentic relationships, communicate impactfully and inspire commitment, even in challenging situations.

FACULTY

Kristen Foster is the trauma outreach coordinator at Children's Nebraska. Foster graduated from the University of Nebraska Medical Center's accelerated nursing program with a bachelor's in nursing. After graduation, she worked as an adult ICU nurse. Foster then spent 10 years as a nurse on Children's Nebraska's neonatal and pediatric critical care transport team. She's been the trauma outreach coordinator at Children's Nebraska for three years and is working toward her master's in nursing and business. Foster's role marries her love for education, collaboration and outreach for pediatric trauma.

Sarah Eason is the trauma system coordinator with the lowa Department of Health and Human Services' Bureau of Emergency Medical and Trauma Services. Eason has 20 years of experience in a Level II adult and pediatric trauma center. Her experience began on the nursing floor and quickly led to emergency nursing. For the last 14 years, Eason's been a flight nurse for AIRMED Air Ambulance. Before joining the State of Iowa, she was the trauma program manager at MercyOne Des Moines Medical Center for six years.

Molly Mackey is the founder and chief learning officer of the LEAdeRNship Institute and the director of knowledge acquisition and transfer at Optimate LifeServices. She received her bachelor's degree and MBA from the University of Iowa. Mackey is a certified talent development professional and has written two books: "52 Powerful Reflection Questions for Leaders" and "52 Powerful Reflection Questions for Emotionally Intelligent Leaders."

Carlos Pelaez, M.D., received his general surgery, trauma and critical care training in New York City. In 2011, Dr. Pelaez joined the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics' surgery department. In 2015, Dr. Pelaez joined the trauma group at Methodist Medical Center in Des Moines and, since 2018, has been the trauma medical director for both level I adult and level II pediatric trauma programs. Dr. Pelaez continues his affiliation with the University of Iowa's College of Medicine as an adjunct clinical associate professor. He is also a reviewer for the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services to assess whether trauma programs meet trauma care standards statewide.

Jonathan Thompson, M.D., became an associate state medical examiner in 2008 and the deputy chief medical examiner in 2016. Before this, Dr. Thompson was an assistant medical examiner at the Hennepin County Medical Examiner's Office in Minneapolis. He received his bachelor's degree in exercise science and his medical degree from the University of Iowa. The American Board of Pathology has certified Dr. Thompson in forensic pathology and anatomic and clinical pathology. He is an associate professor of pathology at the University of Iowa and an adjunct assistant professor of forensic pathology at Des Moines University.
